Support Resolution - St. Lawrence Region Energy Task Force a.

**Decision:** 2025-252 Moved by: J. Martelle Seconded by: W. Smail

WHEREAS the Province of Ontario, through the Integrated Energy Plan 2025 – Energy for Generations, has directed the Independent Electricity System Operator (IESO) and Ontario Energy Board (OEB) to adopt a more integrated, collaborative, and forward-looking approach to electricity system planning;

AND WHEREAS the directives call for the establishment of Major Project Identification Committees (MPICs) in electricity planning regions by December 31, 2025, to better anticipate and coordinate major load growth and infrastructure needs;

AND WHEREAS the St. Lawrence Region – including municipalities served by Hydro One and Rideau St. Lawrence Utilities – faces significant electricity infrastructure constraints that are currently limiting investment, job creation, and economic development;

AND WHEREAS the 2021 Needs Assessment and 2022 Regional Infrastructure Plan failed to adequately reflect the region's growth potential and infrastructure needs, leaving communities at risk of missed opportunities until the next planning cycle begins in 2026;

AND WHEREAS Cornwall Electric, serving the eastern portion of the region, benefits from a unique Power Purchase Agreement with Hydro-Québec, while the rest of the region remains at the furthest end of Ontario's bulk electricity system and faces ongoing limitations;

AND WHEREAS municipalities across the region have expressed a shared interest in proactively coordinating energy planning to ensure local priorities are reflected in provincial forecasting and infrastructure development;

AND WHEREAS the region is home to strategic energy assets, growing industrial demand, and a strong network of aligned municipal councils, economic development directors, and industry leaders ready to collaborate;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal formally supports the creation of a St. Lawrence Region Energy Task Force to serve as a pilot model for proactive, integrated energy planning in Ontario;

AND THAT this Task Force be established in partnership with the Ministry of Energy and Mines, the IESO, and other relevant provincial agencies, with a locally driven terms of reference that reflects the unique needs and opportunities of the St. Lawrence Region;

AND THAT the Council urges the Honourable Stephen Lecce, Minister of Energy and Mines, to direct the IESO to begin immediate work with regional stakeholders to establish the St. Lawrence Region Energy Task Force ahead of the December 2025 MPIC deadline;

WHEREAS the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal acknowledges that municipal infrastructure—roads, bridges, water and wastewater systems—underpins public safety, economic vitality and quality of life in Ontario's rural and small urban communities:

WHEREAS the Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund (OCIF) was created in 2015 to assist small and rural municipalities facing infrastructure deficits that exceed their local revenue capacities:

WHEREAS in 2022 the Government of Ontario committed to increase the annual OCIF envelope from \$100 million to \$400 million over a five-year term, with that commitment scheduled to expire at the end of fiscal 2026;

WHEREAS fixed funding levels amid rising labour, materials and climate resilience costs have eroded the purchasing power of the \$400 million envelope, jeopardizing municipalities' ability to deliver and sustain essential services without incurring unsustainable debt;

WHEREAS predictable, multi-year funding indexed to real-world cost drivers is critical for municipalities to develop, finance and execute long-term asset management plans, reduce emergency repairs and leverage complementary federal and private infrastructure financing;

WHEREAS the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal requires a steadfast provincial partner to extend and enhance OCIF beyond 2026, ensuring infrastructure resilience, fiscal sustainability and equitable access for all small and rural municipalities;

#### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT

- 1. The Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal calls upon the Government of Ontario to extend the annual OCIF envelope at not less than \$400 million beyond its current five-year term ending in 2026, with no reductions in subsequent provincial budgets.
- 2. The Province be requested to index the total annual OCIF envelope—and each individual municipal allocation—to the Ontario Consumer Price Index (CPI), calculated on a calendar-year basis and disbursed in the first quarter of each fiscal year.
- 3. The Ministry of Infrastructure establish a new five-year OCIF funding framework that guarantees annual envelopes and allocation percentages by municipality, enabling long-term capital planning and stable cash-flow management.
- 4. The Province undertake a formal review of the OCIF allocation formula at least once every four years, incorporating current municipal asset management data, demographic projections, climate resilience metrics and rural equity considerations.
- A dedicated contingency reserve equal to 5 percent of the annual OCIF envelope be created within the fund to address extraordinary cost escalations, emergency repairs or project overruns without reallocating core funding.
- 6. The Ministry of Infrastructure publish an annual OCIF performance report—including program disbursements, allocation adjustments and reserve expenditures—in a transparent, publicly accessible online dashboard.
- 7. The Clerk of the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal forward this resolution to:

# 4. Action and Information Items from Committees

 Site Plan Control Agreement SPC - 2025-002 - Skyview BESS Project -114 and 206 Dobbie Road

Council asked for clarification on the construction process and whether there would be negative impacts on the neighbours as the facility is being built. Council also inquired about the need for any fire apparatus' or special equipment as well as public access to the studies and any additional documents.

Staff went through the application and the various conditions within, which included having Potentia adhere to the municipality's bylaws and policies regarding noise and nuisance complaints. Staff also explained that Potentia has prepared their own Emergency Response Plan which has been reviewed by the municipality's Emergency Services.

Council was informed that the municipality has been provided the required list of plans, a draft stormwater management plan and ecological plan and despite being in draft form the Conservation Authority has given them approval. They have applied for an access permit, a 911 sign has been issued for the site and the developer has entered into a Road Use Agreement with the municipality for the development and will have to enter into another one at time of decommissioning.

The CAO assured Council that they are comfortable with the site plan and conditions, and once the agreement has been finalized and signed they will work with staff on having all studies and records that can be published on the website to be done so. There may be some items that can only be accessible through viewing at the Township Office, and those will be highlighted on the website with contact information provided to schedule an appointment with a member of staff.

Mr. Adams explained that there would be software implemented to assist the Port GM in tracking the progress of the Strategic Plan and its initiatives, while also highlighting the individuals and departments responsible for the specific priorities. Committee asked the consultants to adjust the format of the priorities, to present them in bullet point format for easier reading.

  - a) Grain Operations & Health and Safety Report

Port staff presented an overview of the monthly operations report. Key highlights included wheat traffic was steady for the month, slightly down from 2024, the uncertainty of corn/soybean yields due to drought conditions have possibly led farmers to hold grain on their farms, bin entries for cleaning and inspections have continued, with 250 confined space bin entries completed so far in 2025. There have been no additional learning events in 2025.

b) Maintenance Report

Port staff provided an overview of the monthly report, highlighting the replacement of the valve on the GSI 4000 dryer, the replacement of several broken windows, removal and replacement of the old grading office trailer, preharvest maintenance of #6 and #8 receiving conveyors, the servicing of both the old and new dryers, the installation of lights and signals for the new truck loading and unloading area to weighman's office, and performing routine electrical maintenance.

# c) Financial & Traffic Report

Committee received an overview of the report which outlined the decrease in revenue of approximately \$790K compared to 2024, this was anticipated as the corn export was completed in early 2025 compared to being completed in September of the previous year. The Port has seen an increase in expenses by approximately \$378K over the last three months compared to 2024, the contributing factors are labour and benefits costs, there has also been an increase in necessary training compared to last year, there have also been several repairs done and the Port has invested in the local youth programming with new sponsorships.

#### d) GM Report

Port GM presented the report to Committee, explaining that the Port was issued a Provincial Officer's Order, with a compliance date of August 1, 2025 to ensure that the Salt Storage and Handling Operations Manual is implemented at the site with the basic recommendation of having covered salt storage on site. The GM highlighted the delivery of a temporary replacement grading trailer and washroom services trailer for truckers, the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. The Port has welcomed many visitors, including the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Agri-Business, and will continue to meet with various ministries and partners to build relationships and showcase how much of an asset the Port is.

#### e) Capital Projects

Port staff provided a summary of the report and requested that item 1. Covered Storage – Bulk Cargo West Uplands, be deferred to 2026 once they have received study results. Committee asked for clarification on the trailer that has been leased, it was explained that the trailer is temporary, a design has been sent to Elantra and the new trailer will be built and delivered in 2026 at a lower cost than budgeted. Discussion ensued around the Grain Elevator Bin Walls and their exterior covering, there will be a new contract issued and the application will be reassessed.

Staff presented the report to Committee, explaining that the reserve fund was created in 2015 and that it's atypical for two systems to need replacing in the same year and that there are only seven properties in total remaining that were identified by the MTO report prior to transferring ownership of Hwy#2 to the County. Road salt was cited as the cause and that there is no known end date to this program.

#### 7. Delegations and Presentations

Treasurer presented to Committee, discussion ensued around the reserves vs expenses, assessment values, OCIF (Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund) amounts and how that could affect the capital budget. Committee asked for clarification on the washroom improvements, which are located at the pool facilities. Debate around the road program and more specifically Pittston Rd occurred, with various options discussed around the type of surface work to be completed.

#### 8. Discussion Items

a. 2026 Capital Business Case Studies

The CAO explained the packages in front of them, that nothing will be approved at this meeting, however items can be removed or added and will be brought back in November with the funding component attached. Committee was directed to reach out to the CAO with any questions over the next month, who will direct their questions to the appropriate Department Head.

Committee discussed the material used for the accessible ramp, life expectancy of the holiday signage, and the addition of the play structure in Spencerville. Staff were asked if they could get another year out of the side-by-side and if some of the new picnic tables could be placed at the Cardinal pavilions.

Committee would like to keep the Spencerville play structure and washroom upgrades in the budget to see what funding options are brought forward by staff, i.e. accessibility grants.

Committee requested staff submit permit applications to South Nation Conservation Authority for remediation efforts along the shoreline in Cardinal as part of the waterfront clean-up efforts.

Committee decided to move forward with Pittston Road and the joint tender with SDG, discussing the various resurfacing techniques and desired asphalt thickness. Committee requested staff remove Cedar Grove from the Capital Budget for 2026 and move it to 2027 allowing for additional funds to be allotted for the Pittston Rd project if necessary.

The remaining items will return in November with funding attached for Committee to review, discuss and offer direction.

#### b. Spencerville Lagoon ECA Amendment

Staff presented report to Committee, explaining that Phase 1 is complete with Phase 2 requiring a Public Meeting Centre, recommending to Committee that they wait to move onto Phases 3 and 4 as they come with much higher costs and the hope is that there will be new solutions and technology available that could cost less. Staff explained that currently the system could see 20-30 homes added.

#### c. ICI Bluebox Collection Service Update

Staff presented to Committee, explaining that the service will no longer be offered to municipalities who are offering to pay for the service. Mayor Deschamps has requested staff apply for a delegation at ROMA (Rural Ontario Municipal Association Conference) with MECP (Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks). Discussion ensued around various options, whether the municipality can offer bins or other pick-up options, with the concern that waste contributions will increase if there is no recycling pick up for ICI's.

Staff confirmed that Edwardsburgh Cardinal has approximately 130 ICI's, and Committee requested that additional communication goes out to each ICI ahead of the January 1st, 2026 transition, allowing them enough time to make arrangements.

Topic: 2025 Rate-Based Budgets Q3 Update

#### Background:

Over the past five years (2021-2025), the Township's rate-based systems have shown overall stability, with a combined surplus of approximately \$39,800 across all systems. While some systems have maintained positive results, others have experienced deficits. During this same period, the Township made significant capital investment of approximately \$4.77 million, primarily within the Cardinal Water and Wastewater systems, to support critical infrastructure renewal. However, these substantial capital commitments were not accompanied by corresponding rate increases, which have contributed to pressure on reserve levels.

An attachment to this report illustrates the five-year trends for surplus and deficits results, rate adjustments, and capital spending for each of the Township's rate-based systems.

As we begin looking ahead to the 2026 budget discussions, an overview of the financial position of our rate-based departments is being provided to help support council's planning and decision-making.

#### Spencerville Wastewater:

As of the third quarter of 2025, the Spencerville wastewater system is in a stable financial position, with both revenues and expenses to remain closely aligned with budget projections. Revenues are projected to finish the year slightly below budget; however, this is expected to be offset by lower-than-budgeted operating expenses.

Staff will plan to continue with a 3.8% rate increase for 2026 in accordance with the Township's asset management plan to maintain long-term financial sustainability and support future infrastructure needs.

#### Industrial Park Wastewater & Water:

The industrial park wastewater and water systems continue to operate within a sustainable financial framework. For wastewater, operating expenses are minimal due to the fact that the majority of these expenses are invoiced annually from the Town of Prescott. It is anticipated that it will be lower than in previous years due to reduced wastewater flows resulting from the dry conditions experienced this year.

Effective July 1, 2025, rates for both systems were increased by 10%. This adjustment reflected the Town of Prescott's 2024 rate increase, along with 4% for 2025. For 2026, staff will align the rate adjustment with the increase decided by the Wastewater Treatment Facility Board.

#### Cardinal Wastewater & Water:

There are several key items to note for the Cardinal Wastewater and Water systems for 2025. Revenues for both systems are expected to fall short of the budgeted amount. As of the third quarter, 39.15% of the wastewater revenue budget and 35.29% of the water revenue budget remain, whereas approximately 25% remaining would be expected at this point in the year. This shortfall will be partly offset by reduced operating expenses, which are trending below budgeted levels for the year.

A more detailed analysis of reserve levels, consumption trends, and the rates required to sustain operating and capital needs has been completed. The primary area of concern is the wastewater system, which now includes a debenture payment that requires additional offsetting revenue to remain sustainable.

To address this concern, staff have developed a few potential strategies to improve the system's financial position while minimizing the impact on user rates:

- 1. Transfer a portion of the Cardinal Water reserve to the Cardinal Wastewater reserve to help balance funding between the two systems.
- Redirect the annual dividend received from Rideau St. Lawrence to the Cardinal Wastewater reserve instead of the Cardinal Hydro reserve until the wastewater reserve reaches a healthy balance.

Attachments to this report include financial projections for the years 2025 through 2030, illustrating the long-term impacts of these two proposed strategies. The projections assume stable consumption, 3% annual operating expenses increase, no transfers from reserves, and no new users added to the system. The analysis shows that by the end of 2030, the required rate adjustments would result in both systems reaching their minimum reserve balance targets, ensuring financial stability and compliance with the reserve policy.

The proposed rate increases for 2026 would result in the following dollar value increase for the average homeowner per month:

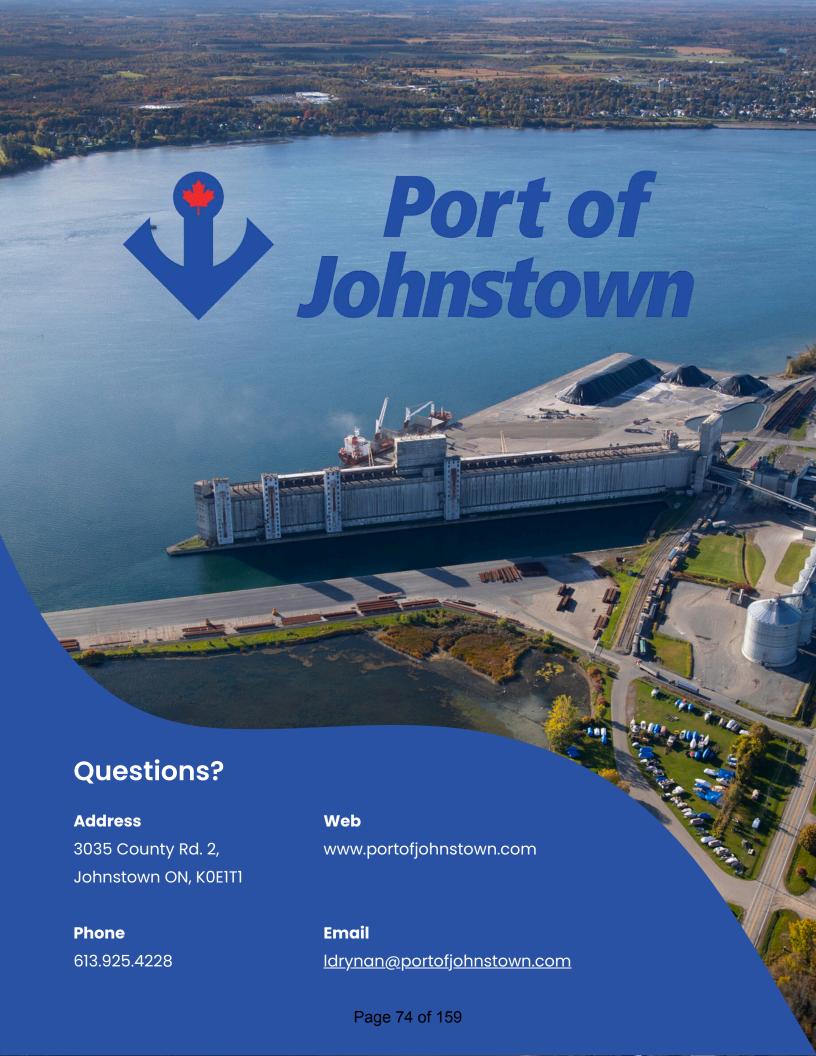

**Topic:** 2025 Plow Truck Financing Options

Purpose: To provide Council with an overview of financing options available for the

purchase of the 2025 plow truck.

**Background:** In July 2024, Council awarded (R2024-182) the 5 Tonne Truck plus related Snow Plow Equipment Tender EC-PW-24-07 to Premier Truck Group with a delivery timeline of fall 2025. The purchase of a new plow truck will support winter operations and maintain service levels. The approved funding source for the purchase is debt financing. The total purchase price of the plow truck, including HST is \$403,625.25. The estimated delivery of the plow truck is before the end of November 2025.

Preliminary discussions with the bank regarding the equipment credit facility indicate the following options for a term loan amortized over a 7-year period, subject to monthly blended payments:

Option	Interest Rate	Blended Monthly Payment	Notes
4-year fixed	3.72%	\$5,461.48	Loan renewal at end of 4 years
5-year fixed	3.81%	\$5,478.12	Loan renewal at end of 5 years

**Policy Implications:** All financial items over \$75,000 require Council approval. The Debt Management Policy 2017-61 allows for use of term loan with any Canadian Bank 6-10 years for specialized vehicle/equipment.

**Strategic Plan Implications:** Financing through a structured loan arrangement supports the Township's strategic goal of delivering services effectively and efficiently

by spreading the cost over time. The Township can maintain service levels without significant impact to the operating budget or depleting reserves.

**Financial Considerations:** The total purchase price of the plow truck, including HST, is \$403,625.25. The bank has provided three term loan options, two have renewals and one is fully amortized. The 4-year and 5-year term loans carry interest rate renewal risk, as the rates may change with the loan is renewed at the end of the fixed term. The 7-year term loan mitigates this risk with a fully amortized rate. Staff have reviewed the budget impacts and confirm that payments can be accommodated under all scenarios.

**Recommendation:** THAT Municipal Council approve financing for the purchase of the plow truck in the amount of \$403,625.25 through a term loan AND direct the treasurer to enter into a 7-year fixed term loan at 4.01%.

Purpose: To recommend award of EC-PW-25-14 for the collection of curbside solid

waste to HGC Management Inc.

**Background:** On September 11<sup>th</sup>, the Township issued a request for proposals for the provision of curbside collection and disposal of waste in accordance with the specified service requirements, terms and conditions. The contract effective date listed was January 1, 2026 and duration specified was three (3) years with the option of two (2) one (1) year extensions subject to mutual agreement by both parties.

On October 1<sup>st</sup>, an addendum was issued in response to inquiries related to the request for proposal. Submitters were required to provide information in the following areas:

- Company Profile: listing key team members, any MOL or MECP orders within the last 3 years, H&S plan and WSIB clearance certificate
- Relevant Reference and Experience
- List of Subcontractors
- Fleet details: including CVOR Level 2 report
- Plans related to operations, quality control and communications

At the time of closing, one submission was received from HGC Management Inc. and determined to meet all the submission requirements. Staff reached out to (3) three other potential submitters that had communicated interest in the opportunity to determine rationale for declining to provide a submission. Responses varied from each vendor and included the following:

- Insufficient lead time to secure a vehicle.
- Given the area and potential competitors, determined they were unable to provide competitive pricing.

The provision of curbside collection presents some challenges and opportunities for improvement. In evaluating the current contract, HGC Management Inc. has performed the service satisfactorily over the contract duration. Complaints have arisen and will continue to arise with this type of service regardless of the service provider. There are two main areas that must continue to be focused on moving forward and they center around education and respect.

<u>Education:</u> open lines of communication between service provider, Township and residents in understanding their roles and responsibilities in the process. The changes in the Blue Box regime add greater complexity.

Respect: Have appreciation and empathy for the frontline people providing the service.

**Policy Implications:** The procurement policy requires that contracts above the value of \$75,000.00 and where contracts extend beyond the current term of Council, must be approved by Council.

**Strategic Plan Implications:** Aligns with objective 2.3 ensuring that services delivered are effective and efficient.

**Financial Considerations:** HGC Management Inc. submitted the following pricing listed in the table below:

The pricing submitted is competitive based on our current one-year extension agreement at \$342,000.00 and the table below, which lists the dollar values submitted by the (3) three other proponents for the solid waste portion of the previous RFP issued in late 2021 for the years 2022-2024.

Topic: Community Safety Zone - Henderson & Section of Bennett/CR44

**Purpose:** To recommend the establishment of a designated community safety zone on Henderson Street and along the section of Bennett Street/CR44 between Sloan Street and Goodin Road.

**Background:** A member, under the Council inquiries portion of the September 29 Council meeting, noted a resident letter from the correspondence package requesting the establishment of a rate of speed in the school zone around Centennial 67.

School zones are a specific type of community safety zone that includes the area around a school property, with reduced speed limits during certain hours (ex. arrivals/departures), and may or may not have doubled fines depending on whether it's also designated as a community safety zone.

Community safety zones (CSZs) are designated road sections, typically near schools, hospitals, and parks, where fines for traffic violations are doubled to improve safety for pedestrians and other vulnerable road users.

Staff have reviewed the area with UCLG, the Centennial 67 principal and OPP community safety officer. There seems to be support for the establishment of a community safety zone in this area. This would be consistent with the CSZ that exists in Johnstown near the South Edwardsburgh public school (Bylaw 1999-0015).

The posted 50km/h speed limit would remain and the safety zone would be effective at all times. We would educate through social media messaging to advise users of the change and requirements.

#### Area Map



**Policy Implications:** Section 214.1(1) of the Highway Traffic Act permits municipal council to pass a by-law designating a part of a highway under its jurisdiction as a community safety zone, if, in the council's opinion, public safety is of special concern on that part of the highway.

In 2016, a community safety zone policy was established to assist in the decision-making process. A copy of the policy is attached.

**Strategic Plan Implications:** In alignment with the mission statement "to grow a safe, healthy community, while providing sustainable services for all to enjoy."

**Financial Considerations:** There would be some costs associated with signage purchase and installation. The enforcement component would be a base cost under the current policing model and not an additional fee for service.

**Recommendation:** That Municipal Council pass a bylaw to establish a designated community safety zone on Henderson Street and along the section of Bennett Street/CR44 between Sloan Street and Goodin Road.

#### "A BY-LAW TO ESTABLISH A COMMUNITY SAFETY ZONE POLICY"

**WHEREAS** Section 214.1(1) of the Highway Traffic Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter H.8, as amended by Bill 26, Chapter 6, Statutes of Ontario 1998 provides the Council of a municipality to designate community safety zones on parts of highways under its jurisdiction;

WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Edwardsburgh/Cardinal deems it advisable to adopt a Community Safety Zone Policy;

**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Edwardsburgh/Cardinal enacts as follows:

- 1. The Community Safety Zone Policy attached hereto as Schedule "A" shall form apart of this by-law.
- 2. That this By-law shall come into force and take effect upon passing.

Read a first and second time in open Council this 24th day of May, 2016.

Read a third and final time, passed, signed and sealed in open Council this 24<sup>th</sup> day of May, 2016.

#### Schedule "A"

#### **Community Safety Zone Policy**

#### BACKGROUND

Community Safety Zones are designated on roadways deemed advisable for safety reasons near areas of high pedestrian traffic and sensitive users such as schools, day-care centres, retirement residences and areas defined as high collision locations. Public safety is of special concern at these locations. Community Safety Zones are regulated under the *Highway Traffic Act* and are designated by by-law specifying the zone limits, and hours, days of the week and months of the year during which it is in effect.

#### OBJECTIVE

With the intent of modified motorist behaviour and increased safety for all road users, the Township of Edwardsburgh/Cardinal has established criteria that must be met in order to designate a Community Safety Zone. There are three criteria that must be satisfied in order to designate a section of a road as a Community Safety Zone; all three criteria must be satisfied.

#### Criteria #1 - Areas of Special Consideration

Community Safety Zones must only be implemented at locations of special concern that are obvious to the road user. Therefore, Community Safety Zones may only be implemented at the following locations:

- Elementary or Secondary schools
- Daycare centres
- Retirement residences or seniors centres
- Community centres
- High pedestrian traffic locations

For purposes of this criteria, a high pedestrian traffic location is defined as a location that experiences more than 75 pedestrians per hour, for any 8 hours of the day.

#### Criteria #2 – Safety Criteria

The safety criteria is comprised of a collision component and a risk component. Either the collision component or the risk component must be met in order to satisfy the Safety Criteria.

<u>Collision Component:</u> A Community Safety Zone may be implemented if the collision ratio is less than 1:900 (collisions per year: AADT) averaged over 36 consecutive months.

Risk Component: It is recognized that a significant safety concern may exist even though it is not reflected in the collision component; the risk component addresses

this safety concern and assesses the elements of risk that may exist on the potential Community Safety Zone site.

Below is a list of six risk factors that are considered to be essential in assessing the level of risk at a potential Community Safety Zone. If 6 points are scored then the area is at low risk, if 7-12 points are scored then the area is at moderate risk, and if 13-18 points are scored then the area is at high risk. Therefore, a minimum of 13 points must be accumulated to satisfy the risk component of the safety criteria.

Prior to assessing the risk component of the safety criteria, field observations or local law enforcement must verify that there is an unusually high violation rate in the subject location.

#### Criteria #3 – Ability to Enforce

The implementation of a Community Safety Zone requires the commitment of enforcement. Community Safety Zones are enforced by local law enforcement which in the case of the Township of Edwardsburgh/Cardinal would be the OPP. This criteria ensures that sufficient resources are available to provide the necessary enforcement.

#### ADDITIONAL NOTIFICATION

The legislation does not specify limits on the size of a Community Safety Zone. The size of a zone will depend on the nature of the safety issue(s). A Community Safety Zone, for example, could encompass all streets surrounding a particular site or contrarily, only a section of a street fronting a particular site.

The legislation does not specify duration for a Community Safety Zone. The intention of a Community Safety Zone is to address a specific problem and is to be removed once the problem is resolved.

The time period that a Community Safety Zone is in effect will vary per location, depending on the site and the nature of the safety issue(s). A zone may only be in effect during certain times of the day, days of the week or months of the year.

#### "BEING A BY-LAW TO ESTABLISH A COMMUNITY SAFETY ZONE UNDER THE HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ACT."

WHEREAS subsection 214.1 of the Highway Traffic Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter H.8 as amended, authorizes municipal councils to designate, by by-law, a part of a highway under its jurisdiction as a community safety zone;

AND WHEREAS Council has deemed that there are school zones within the municipality that merit designation as community safety zones;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Edwardsburgh enacts as follows:

- 1. That the following parts of municipal highway be designated as community safety zones:
  - a) Second Street from Sophia Street to Mary Street in front of South Edwardsburg Public School;
  - Mary Street, Elizabeth Street and Sophia Street north from b) County Road 2 to Fourth Street.
- 2. By-law No. 99-12 is hereby revoked.
- 3. This by-law shall come into force and take effect upon the erection of the regulated signage.

TOPIC: Site Plan Amendment Agreement (SPC-2025-003), 2320 Brouseville Road

#### **PURPOSE:**

To review a draft Site Plan Control Amendment Agreement for site plan control application number SPC-2025-003, affecting the property addressed as 2320 Brouseville Road.

The applicant proposes to amend an existing site plan control agreement (By-Law 2022-63) which is registered on title at the property municipally addressed 2320 Brouseville Road. The owner/applicant is ready to proceed with Phase 2 to expand the self-storage facility.

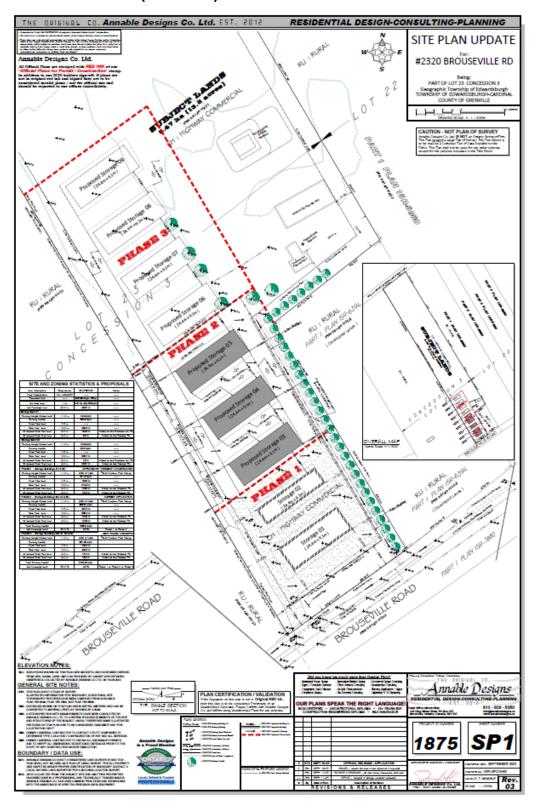
Phase 2 proposes three multi-unit, self-storage buildings (buildings 3, 4 and 5 as per the submitted site plan drawing) totaling 668.61 square metres, north of the existing self-storage buildings (Phase1).

The total combined building area of Phases 1 and 2 is 1,256.8 square metres which results in 2.3% lot coverage.

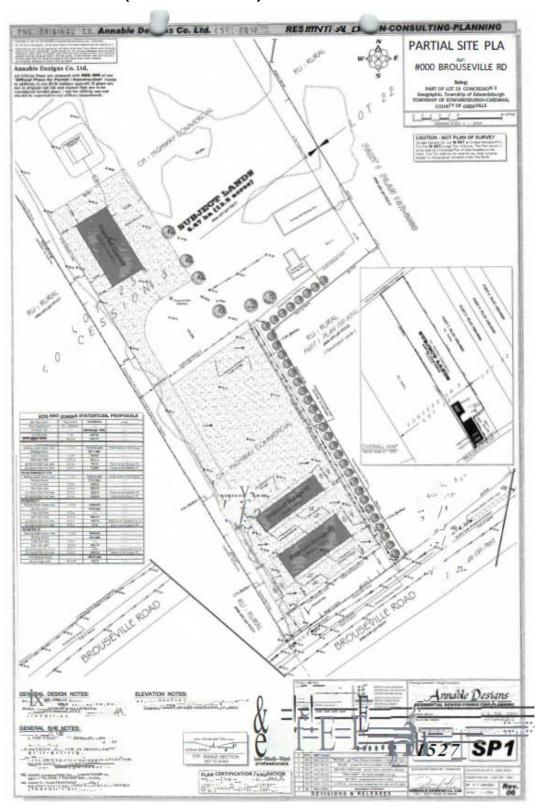
The site plan drawing also provides a concept for Phase 3 which will be addressed through a future site plan control amendment application.

The cover-all building with on-site services approved through Phase 1 has been removed from the original site plan.

#### **EXISTING SITE PLAN (BY-LAW 2022-63)**



#### **BACKGROUND:**

An application under Section 41 of the Planning Act was submitted by David Annable of Annable Designs on behalf of the owner McKenzie Desjardins, to amend an existing site plan agreement for the property at 2320 Brouseville Road. The application was deemed complete by staff on October 8<sup>th</sup>, 2025 and circulated to internal and external agencies for comments.

The subject property is subject to an existing site plan approval through By-Law 2022-63, being a site plan agreement for Phase 1 which is registered on title of the property. The site is developed with two multi-unit, self-storage buildings within a fenced and graveled area with secure access from Brouseville Road.

Phase 1 also included a cover all building north of Phase 1 which also proposed a sewage disposal system and well to provide services to the cover-all building. The new owner of the property (McKenzie Desjardins) does not wish to proceed with the cover-all building and on-site services and proposes to expand the self-storage use through Phases 2 and 3.

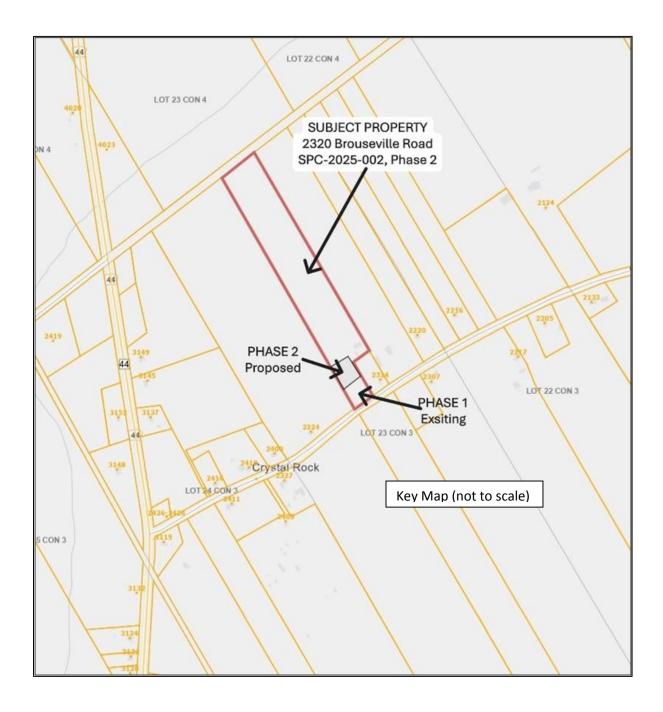
The owner/applicant and agent, consulted with township staff regarding the proposed expansion of the self-storage units and was informed to submit a site plan control amendment application and its required application fee.

The application has been deemed complete and opened. Planning staff reviewed the application for Phase 2 and determined that the expansion of the use, design, fencing, access and use of existing vegetation as per Phase 1 will comply with Official Plan policies and requirements of the Zoning By-Law. Phase 2 appears to be located within the graveled and fenced area as per the approved site plan drawing in By-Law 2022-63.

#### LOCATION:

The subject property has a lot area of 5.47 hectares with approximately 49 metres of road frontage on Brouseville Road and a lot depth of approximately 612 metres. The site is developed with two multiple unit, self-storage buildings with secured gated access from Brouseville Road.

Two pre-existing accessory structures (agricultural storage buildings) remain on the site.



#### **POLICY & BY-LAW**

#### **County Official Plan Designation:**

Rural Area, Mineral Aggregate Resources (Tertiary), Natural Heritage System.

#### **Township Official Plan Designation:**

Rural Policy Area, Significant Woodland, Sand and Gravel Resources

#### Zoning By-Law 2022-37:

Highway Commercial (CH) Zone

#### SITE PLAN CONTROL AMENDMENT APPLICATION, SPC-2025-003:

The existing and proposed development is subject to the Site Plan Control Application process and therefore subject to Section 41 of the *Planning Act* and the policies of Section 7.3, Site Plan Control in the Township Official Plan.

Township staff have been working with the applicant to address technical comments raised by internal and external agencies through the technical circulation process.

Copies of the Site Plan Agreement (By-Law 2022-63), Phase 2 drawings and Draft Site Plan Amending agreement are attached as Exhibits to this report.

The following is a breakdown of the proposed amendments to the plan:

i. <u>Proposed Changes to Original Site Plan</u>: The previous owner (2788821 Ontario Inc, applied for Site Plan Approval in 2021/2022 to establish a landscaping business and self-storage units on the site. The site plan was approved and the Site Plan Agreement (By-Law 2022-63) was registered on title of the property.

The development was to permit two multi-unit, self storage building located in a fenced area with a graveled area while providing an area north of the storage buildings to provide open storage of recreation vehicles, etc. A coverall building was proposed behind the secure storage area which was intended to house a landscaping business serviced with a proposed well and sewage disposal system.

The current owner does not intend to proceed with the coverall building or establish a well and sewage disposal system and proposes to expand the self-storage use in two additional Phases.

The site plan amendment application (SPC-2025-003) is only for Phase 2 of the development which is intended to establish three multi-unit, self storage buildings within the area previously approved for open storage. Grading and drainage will remain as previously approved however fencing may have to be altered to adjust for the location of the new buildings.

The future Phase 3 will be required to undergo the site plan approval process.

- ii. Road Access: The existing secure/ gated access from Brouseville Road will be maintained. Alterations to the internal driveway and access not proposed.
- iii. <u>Drainage</u>: An existing drainage ditch which was established through Phase 1, is located along the eastern lot line, parallel with the abutting property at 2314 Brousevlle Road. Phase 2 will be located within the area intended for outdoor storage and will continue to maintain the approved grades which will continue to direct surface water to the drainage ditch and discharge into the roadside ditching along Brouseville Road.
  - Phase 2 would appear to have no negative impacts on the existing grades and drainage, however Phase 3 will require additional grading and drainage information which will be reviewed through a future site plan control application.
- iv. <u>Landscaping and Buffering</u>: Phase 2 proposes no additional landscaping and will maintain the existing landscaping which was established through Phase 1 which provides buffering from the residential use on the adjacent lot at 2314 Brouseville Road. The row of trees will continue to provide visual buffering between the two properties and its uses and is not anticipated to result in any negative impacts.

#### **CONCLUSION:**

Staff determined that the proposal is in keeping with the intent of the Rural Area policies and the policies pertaining to site plan control in the Official Plan, and complies with the regulations of the Zoning By-law.

The proposal will allow a growing business within the township to expand its existing development on an existing lot to meet their intended needs. The township's policies encourages and promotes the growth of new and existing businesses in the township.

The site plan control amending agreement (Exhibit A) which will be registered on title of the property will recognize the approved plans, studies and reports and will provide the developer with conditions which are required to be satisfied throughout the development.

#### **POLICY IMPLICATIONS:**

Section 41 of the Planning Act permits a municipality to establish a site plan control area (or areas) within the municipality. The Township has established a Site Plan Control By-law through By-Law 2023-47.

#### STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLICATIONS:

This site plan control amending agreement aligns with the Township's Growth and Economic Development priority by supporting commercial and industrial development in a manner that ensures sustainable and responsible growth, while providing employment growth and commerce.

#### FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The applicant has submitted the required application fee to the Township for the site plan control application, in accordance with the Planning Fees Bylaw 2022-40.

The applicant will be responsible for the cost of the agreement to be registration on title by Township Legal Counsel.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That Municipal Council enter into a site plan control amending agreement with the property owner at 2320 Brouseville Road, for the expansion of the self-storage units for Phase 2 through site plan application SPC-2025-003; AND THAT the agreement be registered on title of the property.

**WHEREAS:** The Council of the Corporation of the Township of Edwardsburgh/Cardinal deems it advisable under Section 41 of the Planning Act, RSO 1990, to enter into a Site Plan Control Amendment Agreement with the property Owner, McKenzie Desjardins, respecting the further development of a property being more particularly described in Schedule 'A" attached;

**AND WHEREAS**: the Owner has agreed with the Township to undertake, furnish and perform the works, material, matter and things required to be done, furnished and performed in the manner hereafter described in connection with the proposed use of the land and in conformity with the Zoning By-law;

**NOW THEREFORE THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH THAT** in consideration of other good and valuable consideration and the sum of two dollars (\$2.00) of lawful money of Canada now paid by the Owner to the Municipality, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

#### 1. LAND TO WHICH THIS AGREEMENT APPLIES

1.1 This is an agreement made pursuant to the provisions of Section 41 of the Planning Act, RSO 1990. as amended and applies to the lands described in Schedule "A" to this agreement.

#### 2. STATUTES, BYLAWS, LICENSES, PERMITS AND REGULATIONS

- 2.1 The Owner undertakes and agrees that prior to the commencement of any development, redevelopment, site alteration, construction or other works, the Owner shall obtain all necessary permits and approvals required by the Government of Canada, the Province of Ontario or any agency thereof, the Township and any other affected agency.
- 2.2 The Owner undertakes and agrees to comply with the requirements of all relevant municipal bylaws, provincial and federal statutes and regulations, permits, approvals or licenses in addition to the terms of this agreement.

#### 3. SCHEDULES

- 3.1 The Owner hereby agrees that prior written approval by the Township and/or an amendment to a Schedule shall be required for any departure, change or modification from the Schedules.
- 3.2 That the documents listed in Schedule "B" and Schedule "C", and their amendments, are electronically filed with the Township. The approved drawings, studies and reports, and their amendments are available for viewing by contacting the Township Office.
- 3.3 The following list of schedules attached hereto are deemed to be and form part of this Agreement:

Schedule "A" - Legal Description of the Subject Lands

Schedule "B" - Drawing List

Schedule "C" – Drawing SP1, Site Plan Update

Schedule "D" - Special Conditions

#### 4. REGISTRATION OF AGREEMENT AND COMMENCEMENT OF WORK

- 4.1 The Owner covenants that he/she/they shall not commence any development or site alteration whatsoever until this Agreement is registered on title against the land at the expense of the Owner.
- 4.2. The Owner may submit a written request to commence with site servicing, grading and/or foundation work to the Township, prior to registration of the Site Plan Agreement. The Township shall be satisfied that all required sign off and approvals have been obtained and that there are no further outstanding issues to be resolved.
- 4.3. The Townships Chief Administrative Officer will provide written approval for any works prior to the registration of the agreement.

#### 5. <u>ENTRY BY TOWNSHIP</u>

5.1 Notwithstanding any additional authority in law, the Township, by its officers, servants, agents and contractors, for the life of this Agreement are entitled to enter on the Lands or any part thereof as well as any buildings or structures erected thereon to inspect the construction, operation and maintenance of the works, services and facilities on the Lands for the purposes of determining compliance with this Agreement.

#### 6. <u>COMPLETION DATE</u>

The owner agrees to complete the work required under this Agreement within two (2) years of the date of the commencement of works. Notwithstanding, if exceptional circumstances prevent the owner from complying with the requirements, the Township may extend the completion date.

#### 7. DEFAULT

7.1 In the event the Owner defaults in the performance of an obligation under this agreement or for reasons of public safety as determined by the Chief Building Official under the Building Code Act of Ontario or the Fire Marshall under the Fire Protection & Prevention Act of Ontario, the Township may, at the expense of the Owner, enter upon the lands and do all such matters and things as may be required to comply with any Order of the Chief Building Official or Assistant to the Fire Marshall (local Fire Chief). Such actual costs incurred by the Township plus an overhead charge of 15%, shall be deemed to be recoverable from the Owner by invoice and may be recovered in like manner as municipal taxes pursuant to the Municipal Act.

#### 8. FACILITIES AND WORK TO BE PROVIDED AND MAINTAINED

8.1 The Owner covenants and agrees to provide and maintain, at his/her/their sole expense each and every facility, work or other matter illustrated on the Schedules to the satisfaction of the Township, acting in a commercially reasonable manner, and to engage qualified professionals, where required, to design and carry forth any of the work undertaken under this Agreement. This shall include the restoration of any faulty workmanship or materials.

#### 9. <u>CERTIFICATE OF COMPLIANCE</u>

9.1 Upon the satisfactory completion of all matters and things to be provided and maintained by the Owner pursuant to this Agreement, the Owner shall be entitled to obtain a Certificate of Compliance from the Township confirming that all provisions of this Agreement have been complied with in full to the date of such Certificate.

#### 11. SEVERABILITY:

11.1 The terms of this agreement are severable, and the unenforceability of any part hereof shall not render the whole unenforceable. 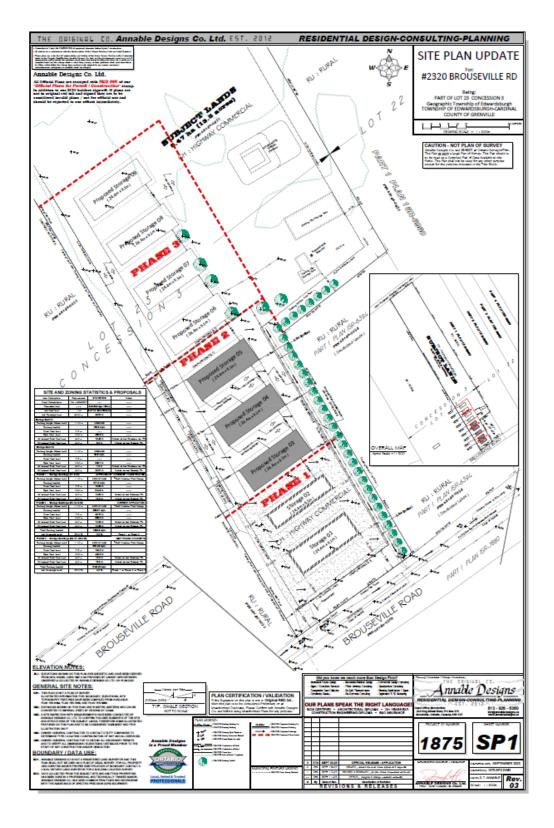

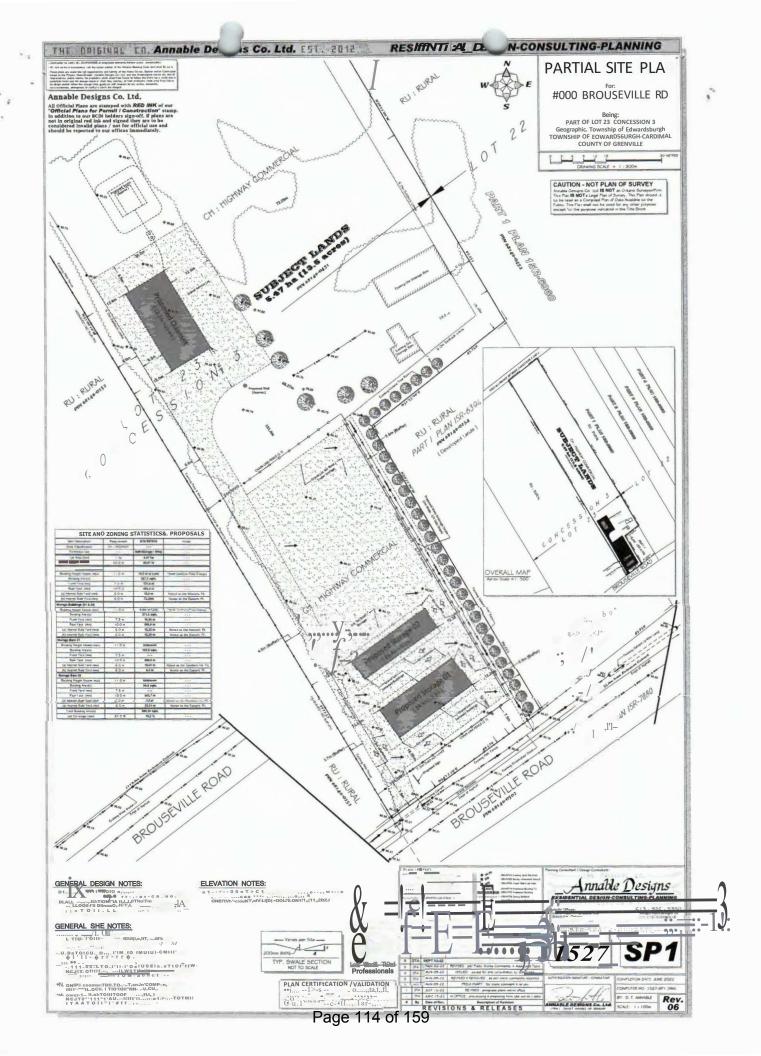

**WHEREAS:** The Council of the Corporation of the Township of Edwardsburgh/Cardinal deems it advisable under Section 41 of the Planning Act, RSO 1990, to enter into a Site Plan Control Amendment Agreement with the property Owner, McKenzie Desjardins, respecting the further development of a property being more particularly described in Schedule 'A" attached;

**AND WHEREAS:** the Owner has applied to the Township in accordance with the Site Plan Control provisions of By-law No. 2023-47, to modify the "original" site plan control agreement between the former owner, 2788821 Ontario Inc. and the Township of Edwardsburgh/Cardinal through By-Law 2022-63 which was registered in the Ontario Land Registry Office as instrument No. C80819 on December 5, 2022;

**AND WHEREAS:** The Original Agreement is hereby amended as set out herein, all of which is hereinafter referred to as "the Site Plan Agreement" and the amendment affects all of the lands described in Schedule "A" hereto, which lands are herein called the "subject lands";

**AND WHEREAS**: the Owner has agreed with the Township to undertake, furnish and perform the works, material, matter and things required to be done, furnished and performed in the manner hereafter described in connection with the proposed use of the land and in conformity with the Zoning By-law;

#### 1. LAND TO WHICH THIS AGREEMENT APPLIES

1.1 This is an agreement made pursuant to the provisions of Section 41 of the Planning Act, RSO 1990. as amended and applies to the lands described in Schedule "A" to this agreement.

#### 2. STATUTES, BYLAWS, LICENSES, PERMITS AND REGULATIONS

- 2.1 The Owner undertakes and agrees that prior to the commencement of any development, redevelopment, site alteration, construction or other works, the Owner shall obtain all necessary permits and approvals required by the Government of Canada, the Province of Ontario or any agency thereof, the Township and any other affected agency.
- 2.2 The Owner undertakes and agrees to comply with the requirements of all relevant municipal bylaws, provincial and federal statutes and regulations, permits, approvals or licenses in addition to the terms of this agreement.

#### 3. SCHEDULES

- 3.1 The Owner hereby agrees that prior written approval by the Township and/or an amendment to a Schedule shall be required for any departure, change or modification from the Schedules.
- 3.2 That the documents listed in Schedule "B" and Schedule "C", and their amendments, are electronically filed with the Township. The approved drawings, studies and reports, and their amendments are available for viewing by contacting the Township Office.
- 3.3 The following list of schedules attached hereto are deemed to be and form part of this Agreement:

#### 4. REGISTRATION OF AGREEMENT AND COMMENCEMENT OF WORK

- 4.1 The Owner covenants that he/she/they shall not commence any development or site alteration whatsoever until this Agreement is registered on title against the land at the expense of the Owner.
- 4.2. The Owner may submit a written request to commence with site servicing, grading and/or foundation work to the Township, prior to registration of the Site Plan Agreement. The Township shall be satisfied that all required sign off and approvals have been obtained and that there are no further outstanding issues to be resolved.
- 4.3. The Townships Chief Administrative Officer will provide written approval for any works prior to the registration of the agreement.

#### 5. ENTRY BY TOWNSHIP

5.1 Notwithstanding any additional authority in law, the Township, by its officers, servants, agents and contractors, for the life of this Agreement are entitled to enter on the Lands or any part thereof as well as any buildings or structures erected thereon to inspect the construction, operation and maintenance of the works, services and facilities on the Lands for the purposes of determining compliance with this Agreement.

#### 6. <u>COMPLETION DATE</u>

The owner agrees to complete the work required under this Agreement within two (2) years of the date of the commencement of works. Notwithstanding, if exceptional circumstances prevent the owner from complying with the requirements, the Township may extend the completion date.

#### 7. DEFAULT

7.1 In the event the Owner defaults in the performance of an obligation under this agreement or for reasons of public safety as determined by the Chief Building Official under the Building Code Act of Ontario or the Fire Marshall under the Fire Protection & Prevention Act of Ontario, the Township may, at the expense of the Owner, enter upon the lands and do all such matters and things as may be required to comply with any Order of the Chief Building Official or Assistant to the Fire Marshall (local Fire Chief). Such actual costs incurred by the Township plus an overhead charge of 15%, shall be deemed to be recoverable from the Owner by invoice and may be recovered in like manner as municipal taxes pursuant to the Municipal Act.

#### 8. FACILITIES AND WORK TO BE PROVIDED AND MAINTAINED

8.1 The Owner covenants and agrees to provide and maintain, at his/her/their sole expense each and every facility, work or other matter illustrated on the Schedules to the satisfaction of the Township, acting in a commercially reasonable manner, and to engage qualified professionals, where required, to design and carry forth any of the work undertaken under this Agreement. This shall include the restoration of any faulty workmanship or materials.

#### 9. <u>CERTIFICATE OF COMPLIANCE</u>

9.1 Upon the satisfactory completion of all matters and things to be provided and maintained by the Owner pursuant to this Agreement, the Owner shall be entitled to obtain a Certificate of Compliance from the Township confirming that all provisions of this Agreement have been complied with in full to the date of such Certificate.

#### 10. <u>NOTICE TO PARTIES</u>

10.1 Any Notice by any party to this agreement to another shall be given in writing and mailed or delivered to the Party:

#### 11. SEVERABILITY:

11.1 The terms of this agreement are severable, and the unenforceability of any part hereof shall not render the whole unenforceable. No forbearance or failure by the Township to strictly enforce any term or covenant herein shall prevent the Township from insisting upon strict compliance by the Owner subsequent to such forbearance or failure to strictly enforce its terms. The terms of this agreement may not be altered except by a subsequent agreement in writing between the parties.

### 12. <u>SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS</u>

12.1 This Agreement shall ensure to the benefit of and be binding upon the respective heirs, personal representatives, successors and assigns of each of the parties hereto.

### 13. FORCE AND EFFECT

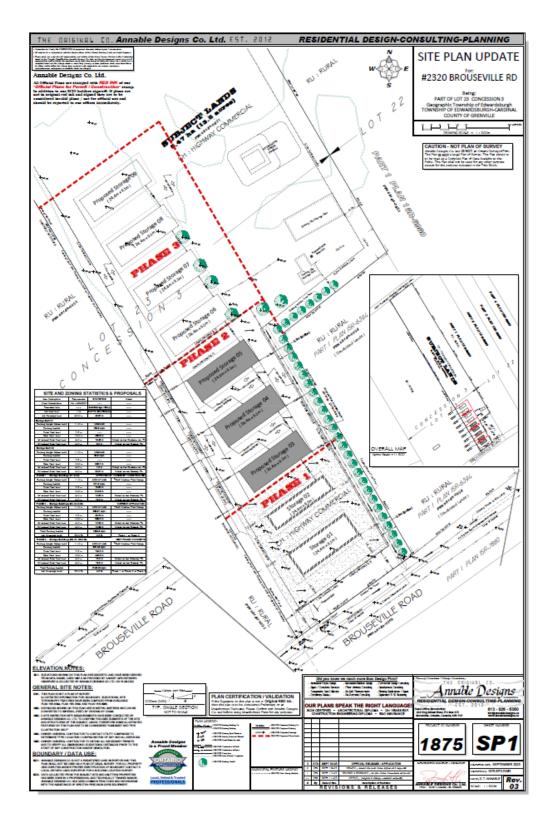

8.1. All outdoor lighting, including fixtures and signs, shall be designed, installed and maintained to prevent light spill over or glare onto the Township Road allowance and neighbouring properties.

#### 9. MAINTAINANCE OF TRAVELED ROADS

- 9.1. The roadways leading to the subject site shall be kept safe, unobstructed, free of debris as a result of the development or construction vehicles leading to or leaving the site. These roadways are:
  - 9.1.1.Brouseville Road (Township Road)
- 9.2. The Township may request the owner to clean and dispose of any debris on the roadway from time to time during the development. Clean up may result from road debris such as but not limited to sand, gravel, mud, soil and construction debris.
- 9.3. Any damage to the roadway, curbing or any other structure within the road allowance as a result of the development, shall be repaired or replaced at the owners cost, to the satisfaction of the township or authority.
- 9.4. Failure to maintain the roadway in a safe state may result in the township conducting the works and transferring the costs of the works to the Owner.

**WHEREAS** the Municipal Act 2001, SO 2001, Chapter 25, Section 8(2) states that in the event of ambiguity, the ambiguity shall be resolved so as to include, rather than exclude, municipal powers that existed before the Municipal Act, 2001 came into force; and

**WHEREAS** the Municipal Act 2001, SO 2001, Chapter 25, Section 9 gives the Municipality the capacity, rights, powers and privileges of a natural person for the purpose of exercising its authority under this Act; and

**WHEREAS** the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal deems it advisable to enter into an agreement for a 7-year Fixed Term Loan at 4.01% with the Royal Bank of Canada;

**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal enacts as follows:

- 1. That the Treasurer is hereby authorized to execute the agreement and necessary documents with the Royal Bank of Canada, attached hereto as Schedule "A", forming part of this bylaw, on behalf of the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal.
- 3. That this bylaw shall come into force and take effect on the date of passing.

## "A BY-LAW TO ADOPT, CONFIRM AND RATIFY MATTERS DEALT WITH BY RESOLUTION"

**NOW THEREFORE** the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal enacts as follows:

That the actions of the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal, at its meeting held on October 30, 2025 in respect of recommendations contained in the reports of committees considered at the meeting and in respect of each motion, resolution and other action taken by the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal at its meeting are, except where the prior approval of the Ontario Municipal Board or other authority is required by law, hereby adopted, ratified and confirmed as if all such proceedings were expressly embodied in this bylaw.
- 2. That the Mayor and the appropriate officials of the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal are hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary to give effect to the actions of the Council of the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal referred to in the preceding section.
- 3. That except as otherwise provided, the Mayor and Clerk are authorized and directed to execute all documents necessary on behalf of the Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal.
